
Sophia and Milo were later rescued, but their parents were never found. Sophia and Milo miss their parents a lot.

Milo loves combing Sophia's hair and giving her hugs. Milo laughs so much that Sophia thinks his extra chromosome must be one that makes people extra happy.






One day, Sophia and Milo were walking down Charlotte Street and looking in the shop windows.

But they had no extra money. Just what they had saved to pay for food and shelter. And they had no family to help them. What were they to do?


Sophia was not sad about not having money. She felt rich because she had a wonderful little brother who loved her. And, she was hopeful that some day her parents would be found too.

Milo loves watching people. And he loves when people watch him. So, he decided to dance.






Milo is really funny when he dances. He spins around in circles. He stomps his feet. He shakes his head. And he makes funny sounds that sound like "la, la, la" really fast.

Use these thoughts to discuss entrepreneurship with your child

- The reason Sophia and Milo do not have parents is to illustrate that children are capable of taking initiative on their own. Also, many children do not have a typical family support system, so they are more able to relate to such circumstances.
- The shipwreck represents a loss of resources and support system. Children may experience significant events in their lives where they feel a sense of loss. The story demonstrates that they can continue to live fulfilling lives after such an event.
- The cost and profit numbers offer an opportunity to discuss these concepts in more detail using examples from your own daily life.
- Reuniting with their mother at the end of the story represents the children finding that inner flame or champion that helps them realize their full potential.

 And, that entrepreneurship often rewards you in ways you did not anticipate.
- The fate of the father is not mentioned so that the story is left open for imagination and further discovery.
- Down Syndrome is a condition where a child is born with an extra chromosome (47 instead of 46). This causes mental and physical delays in how a child develops. Physical features, such as a flat facial profile, eyes with an upward slant, and small mouth and ears, are common. The cause of Down Syndrome is unknown and the effects can vary widely. Despite the challenges, many people with Down Syndrome are able to live happy and productive lives, while enriching the lives of those around them.
